Both are important, of course. Without the developers, one could argue that there would be nothing for the local shop to sell. And don't all retail sales of things flow some money back to the developers? In fact, the money's already gone to the developer at that point; I buy product from the dealer who got it from a distributor who got it from the developer/manufacturer. The developer's had his money for quite some time once I take the product home.

But AC/Amiga is worth supporting, IMHO. If we want a greater-than-48-page issue again, there need to be more advertisers. Even though most readers buy the magazine for the editorial content, it's the ads that pay the bills. We, as Amiga users, need to be telling developers and manufacturers that we saw their adverts in AC/Amiga, and back that up with hard dollar purchases.

## BBS REPORT

Important information was released recently by U.S. Robotics. They developed x2 technology to permit speeds of up to 56k with their 28.8(33.6)k modems over ordinary phone lines.

USR is offering free upgrades for the V.Everything modems, but you must register for the upgrade prior to 31 December 1996. The upgrades will be available early next year. I'm sure the upgrade applies to the Courier models because I regis-

tered my own and the BBS modems. I did not see Sportsters listed on the USR WEB Site, though I've seen ads in the newspaper for Sportsters with this capability. If you own a Sportster, you should try to register for the free upgrade; they can only say no. You have nothing to lose and everything to gain.

You should use your WEB Browser to call U.S. Robotics at:

<http://x2.usr.com>

You will need the purchase date and serial number of your modem(s). The serial number is shown on a stick on tag on the underside of Courier modems. If you can't find this tag, you can obtain the serial number by entering

your Comm Program, the one you use for your computer to talk to your modem, and typing "at-s?" and then hit the Return Key.

That is, type the letters at followed by the tilde followed by the letter s and a question mark. All without quotation marks or spaces. Hit the Return Key and the modem will return the Serial Number of the Modem.

Online is the preferred method of registering. If you do not have Internet capability or an E-Mail address try what ever it

takes to obtain confirmation of registration. You might try calling 1-800-977-7533 and/or complete a printed form similar to the one shown in Figure 1.

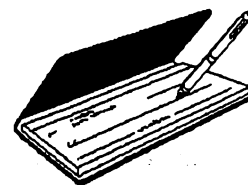

Amiga magazine is. That's why I don't want to lose AC/Amiga.

So what am I doing about it? Well, for starters, I'm stepping back through my software and making sure I'm registered on all the shareware I actually use; that will help the private developers. I'm upgrading all my programs to their latest versions (as much as possible, anyway); that will help the commercial developers.

I've given myself a budget for Computer Stuff every week/month, which I spend at my local Amiga shop (Wentek Computers in Scottsdale, Arizona, (602)483-7200). The proprietor, Rob Wendling, has always been friendly and helpful to me, and he keeps stuff on the shelves to browse. That's important to me -- I like to browse and impulse buy once in a while. And finally, I'm trying to do something to help increase the volume of editorial content in AC/Amiga by writing for them. I've been cutting my teeth by writing for the MECCA newsletter, and have some ideas to submit to Don Hicks, managing Editor of AC/Amiga. I've requested a

copy of their Writer's Guide, to prepare myself more fully. I don't know if I'll actually be published or not, but at least I'm trying.

Through it all, of course, I'm actively supporting my user's group (MECCA). I participate in the regular meetings, and host a technical presentation every so often. ## COMPUTER HAZARDS

**H**ow to Reduce Computer-Related Eye Strain!!!!

your eyes and reduces dryness and strain on the eye muscles.

Probably the most common problem that computer users experience is eye strain. This can be due to many factors. When you sit at your computer, check these situations.

\* Are you wearing bright clothing or jewellery that reflects off the monitor? Try it with darker clothing.

\* Do you sit too close to your monitor? You need to be able to sit three feet away from your CPU and monitor.

\* Is the monitor's brightness set too high? A simple adjustment of the brightness and contrast controls can increase eye comfort.

\* Are the room lights above your computer too bright? The glare can distract your eye's focus. If you can adjust the tilt of the screen, lower it to cut down on the glare.

\* What about windows facing the monitor? Get away from the lights that could reflect off of the monitor.

\* Does your computer work in interlaced mode? Although you can work better in Desktop Publishing and Video production in these resolutions, the constant pulsing of the monitor may create severe eye strain. You may want to save up for a multisync monitor.

\* Is your monitor positioned too high? The top of your monitor should be below your eye level. You may need to take your computer down off of your CPU. Lowering your monitor forces your eyes to look down in a more comfortable position. It allows the eyelids to cover more of

\* Practice resting the eyes throughout the day. Shut your eyes occasionally. Get up and take a break from your computer and try to focus on non-computer related things for a while.

There are some simple and cheap methods to reduce eye strain. There are also expensive, high tech gadgets that

you can get too. There are mesh and optically coated filters that cover the monitor and reduce the glare. There are also antistatic/radiation filters that suppress electromagnetic fields that are emitted from your monitor (more on this in another issue). Privacy filters prevent viewing from either side and also reduce the glare from lighting.

Someone suggested that by buying the lightest-tinted (tortous shell) Poloroid Sun Glasses that this reduces the glare and is excellent if you run your computer in an interlaced type of mode. Some computers can change to a larger and bolder-sized font in normal computer use.

Another option is to buy a multisync monitor with a higher pitch level. This is better for your eyes too.

Finally, you may need to see an Opthomologist or Optometrist to get your eyes checked.

## VISCORP

### Viscorp Contract Canceled, Attorney Says

Chicago, Nov. 27 (Bloomberg) -- Visual Information Services Corp.'s contract to acquire the assets of Germany's Amiga Technologies GmbH from bankrupt personal computer maker Escom AG was canceled after Viscorp failed to pay the agreed \$20 million, a lawyer for Escom's bankruptcy trustee said.

"They didn't pay the money they were supposed to pay and as a result the contract was canceled in early October," said David Robinson, the lawyer.

The Chicago-based interactive television development company was banking on Amiga's technology to give it an edge in the race to develop the first interactive set-top box for consumers.

Without the technology, a "significant" portion of 6-year-old Viscorp's business could be damaged, the company's chief operating officer, Hugh Jencks, said last week.

Right now, Viscorp has access to Amiga's operating system through a licensing agreement signed in January. If it fails to acquire Amiga's assets, that license will be canceled, Robinson said.

That would put further pressure on Viscorp, which is already struggling. In an Oct. 29 filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission, Viscorp conceded that it "cannot currently generate sufficient revenues and cash flow from operations to meet its business obligations."

Viscorp Chairman Jerome Greenberg declined to say how much money the company needs or how urgently. "We have funding in process but I can't tell you any more than that," he said.

Greenberg said the contract for Amiga "expired" because Viscorp did not believe the assets justified the price.

Meanwhile, Hembach has reopened bidding for Amiga with "several" unnamed companies and expects to sign with one of them within a few weeks, Robinson said.

Last week, Jencks, without revealing that the original contract had fallen apart, said Viscorp was still a front-runner in the negotiations.

Robinson said Viscorp is not the leading candidate, though it's not necessarily out of running. "If they came in here tomorrow with a check in the right amount they'd be in the running," he said.

Viscorp maintains that even if it doesn't acquire Amiga's assets, the new owners would

probably re-license the technology to Viscorp.

The company hopes to introduce its ED box by the end of the year. The box connects to a television and telephone line and enables consumers to receive fax and phone calls, play videogames, rent movies, receive electronic mail and access online services, including the Internet, using a TV remote control.

Viscorp had originally offered \$40 million to acquire the whole of Amiga. When Escom declared bankruptcy July 15, Viscorp agreed to pay \$20 million for certain key assets instead.

Viscorp's shares fell 1/2 to 2 7/8.

**O**ur User Group is Amiga Arizona (AmAz!). We feel we have one of the best Amiga User Groups around!. We normally hold regular monthly meetings on the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 207 West Clarendon, Phoenix, AZ. Meeting time is 7-9PM.

At our meetings we provide demonstrations of new or interesting Amiga programs/equipment, sometimes by developers or dealers if we can line them up. 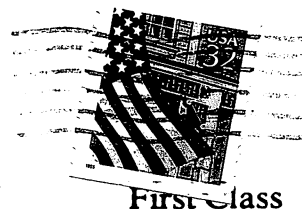
